Our topics for December are



Windows 8 or 8.1 - Resizing Desktop Icons

In the **Desktop Mode** of Windows 8 or 8.1, Icons on the desktop can be incrementally resized, bigger or smaller. Hover in vacant space of the Desktop, hold down the **Ctrl Key** and move the **Scroll Wheel forwards** or **backwards**.

This will incrementally increase or decrease the size of every icon on the desktop – a much nicer solution than the Small, Medium and Large (otherwise available).

"Cloud" Computing

The advent of the "Cloud Computing" provides many positive avenues for us to store and retrieve information

Microsoft, Apple, Adobe, Google all provide "cloud space" for users free of charge for small amounts of data. Additional space is charged.

Why would I use "cloud" space?

- 1. **PHOTOS** people who travel upload their photos on this space. It can show others their adventures or retrieved when they return home. In countries where wi-fi is free this works particularly well.
- 2. **DATA** if you are working on documents in one place but want access at another time or place they can be retrieved and worked on. For example you could be working on a travel diary entering your experiences whilst on that journey. If your notebook, phone or tablet has limited storage space this provides one solution.
- 3. APPS / BOOKS / MUSIC TRANSFER those whose who use iTunes can download songs to all their devices using Apple's "icloud". These are available for download from their store whenever you need them almost. If the song or app is removed from the store it doesn't appear in the list to be downloaded. My advice is keep a backup of music, apps, books on your computer and another backup on a removable drive

There are many other uses including access to email, contacts etc the list goes on.

However there are disadvantages that may need to be considered. These disadvantages were outlined in a recent ASCCA newsletter and are summarized here.

Some Disadvantages of Cloud Computing

- 1. **Possible downtime.** Cloud computing makes you dependent on the reliability of your Internet connection. When it's offline, you're offline.
- 2. Security issues. How safe is your data? Cloud computing means Internet computing. So you should not be using cloud computing applications that involve using or storing data that you are not comfortable having on the Internet. Established, reliable cloud computing vendors will have the latest, most sophisticated data security systems possible as they want your business and realise that data security is a big concern. However when you read that companies such as Sony and Adobe have been "hacked" it provides concerns.
- 3. **Cost.** At first glance, a cloud computing application may appear to be a lot cheaper than a particular software solution installed and run in-house, but you need to be sure you're comparing apples and apples.

Does the cloud application have all the features that the software does and if not, are the missing features important to you?
