First "port of call" was the James Theatre where an informative talk from Anne and an inspection of this historic building was most enlightening. The theatre is currently the oldest running picture theatre in Australia, and one of only 4 theatres finished with a Spanish Mission facade. Next, we had a tour of the main street of Dungog with Alan pointing out various historic buildings and their history – truly amazing, and dating back to the 1800's.



The town was really buzzing that day, with numerous activities happening including Pedalfest (an annual cycling rally), the annual Dungog Art Exhibition and the monthly markets, and topped off with the Federal Election which was sprung on the same day after our arrangements were locked in.



With weary feet and "information overload", we returned to Victoria's home for a refreshing drink and a bite to eat, the afternoon being free time. A hot spike in the weather probably took a little gloss of what turned out to be an enjoyable day.
