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President's Report

By now you should have seen notice of our Annual General Meeting on 12 August. That means that my year as President is coming to an end. Of course I will fully report on the year at the meeting, however I would like to give a brief summary of how I viewed the year and some of the challenges I see for the year ahead.

As I accepted the Presidency last August I was expecting a "steady as she goes" year with the major challenge being Windows 10, which had just been released by Microsoft as a free upgrade for all with Windows 7 or Windows 8.1. That has all happened and now the year of the freebie is over. If you did not upgrade then you have missed out. Not to worry Windows 7 and Windows 8.1 will still work and be supported until January 2020 and 2023 respectively.

The "steady as she goes" ended in early October when Matthew, the Islington Public School Principal wandered in and informed us that we had to vacate our home of 13 years by years end. "Cat among the pigeons". What are we going to do? As you will know we were fortunate in the end being able to move just next door. It was a big effort moving, made easy by the willing participation of many of our members.

A big issue now is our ongoing future, as, while we are quite adequately accommodated and Windows 10 is bedded in, our revenue is well below our now significantly increased costs. We are fortunate to have sufficient reserves built up over the years that we enjoyed low rental in the school to pay our bills for the immediate future. The really big issue is our future two or three years out when, on current trends, our cash reserves will be drained.

We gained significant recognition this year with a Seniors Week achievement award presented to us by the Newcastle State Member Tim Crakanthorp. And Newcastle City Council did us proud by featuring us significantly in the 2016 Seniors Directory. We have also been successful in gaining a small grant from Newcastle City Council for development and provision of lessons on "the online" stuff that we Seniors need to do.

I am proud of the community service that we are able to provide to the Seniors in our area (which extends well beyond Newcastle) and pleased that I have been President for this year 2015-2016. I am also confident that we, as a club, have lots to offer our members into the future. By participation you gain knowledge and skills giving a sense of achievement.

Spread the word among your friends and acquaintances, ComputerPals Newcastle helps Seniors master their technology based devices - Computers, Tablets, Smart Phones and Cameras. Have some fun, learn a lot in our friendly atmosphere in the Clubroom or on an outing.


Social Day Out—July

Tech Talk—

Your Phone Can Read to You

If you have a difficult time reading on your smart device, you can have your phone do it for you. Text-to-speech capabilities on smart devices may not be quite as fluent as a regular human speaking voice, but the technology has come a long way and will improve with each update. Here's how to make your Apple or Android device read to you.

On your iPhone / iPad:

Go to 'Settings' > 'General', then scroll down and tap 'Accessibility' > 'Speech', then tap 'Speak Selection'.

Now that the 'Speak Selection' feature is turned on you can select a slab of text and press the 'Speak' button and your phone will read it to you.

You can also have your phone ready ou the entire contents of a screen. Here's how to do it:

Go to 'Settings' > 'General', then scroll down and tap 'Accessibility' > 'Speech', then tap 'Speak Screen'.

Once you have 'Speak Screen' turned on, our phone can read to you anything that appears on your screen. To try it out, head to your favourite website or app and when you're ready, use two fingers and swipe down from the top of your screen.



If the speaking voice is too rapid, simply go back to 'Settings' > 'General', then scroll down and tap 'Accessibility' > 'Speech', then look for the slider with a turtle at the left and a rabbit to the right. Slide left to slow the speaking voice, or right to speed it up. You can also select from a range of English-speaking voices with different accents. To do this, go to 'Settings' > 'General', then scroll down and tap 'Accessibility' > 'Speech', then tap 'Voices'. From here, you can choose alternative voice styles or, if you'd prefer, you can select a foreign language speaking voice from the many available.

Your Phone Can Read to You continued . . .

On your Android device:

Your Android device can also read to you, but as there are so many makes and models, there is no easy way to explain the process. What we can do though, is point you in the right direction.


In order to enable Google's text to speech, go to settings > accessibility > text-to-speech output.

Your manufacturer may have its own text-to-speech option, so you can switch over to Google's here if you'd rather use that one.


If your device doesn't have Google text-to-speech, you can find it at Google Play.

You can also select a different default language and download any of the growing number of languages (29 at last count).

You'll also see a speech rate, which controls just how fast or slow your device will speak to you. When you slide the bar to the right, the speech rate will get noticably faster. If your volume is turned up, you'll get audio feedback and be able to get a better idea at just how fast or slow you want it.



Additionally, you'll want to make sure you get updates. Touch the settings dial and on the next screen check that autoupdates are turned on. You can also force updates over Wi-Fi and send anonymous usage reports so Google can improve the service.



Select Google text-to-speech engine from the options.

Finally, it's time to try some apps. Google Play Books will read some titles to you, and Google Play Newsstand will do the same with some articles. You can also try out the Talkback features on your phone or tablet to find out what it will say in regards to certain actions.

Accessibility still has a long way to go for those that need it, but this is one step in the right direction.

Ensure that Google text-to-speech gets proper updates.

Text-to-speech capabilities on smart devices may not be as fluent as a regular human speaking voice, but this technology has come a long way and will improve with each update.
