By the end of the **first day** of classes, two of our tutors (who are already committed to teaching various classes) have volunteered to take additional classes on Fridays!! It says a lot for them and also the popularity of the courses. It's obvious that we could run two class-rooms five days per week – (but we won't!!)

Throughout the year, tutors have volunteered to present a wide range of topics to our other tutors, so there is plenty of interest being generated and the involvement of our tutors is really appreciated.

With the flying start to 2009, it looks as though this could be one of our best years. Actually, each year has been more successful than the preceding one ever since our club began.

Don't forget to thank your tutors – that's all the payment they receive and they do appreciate the fact that you appreciate their contribution to what must be one of the most successful ComputerPals groups in the country.

There is an email doing the rounds at the moment that contains some very good tips on how to forward emails. I thought it was worth repeating some of the advice here. *Daphne*

HOW TO FORWARD E-MAIL APPROPRIATELY

(1) When you forward an e-mail, DELETE all of the other addresses that appear in the body of the message (at the top). That's right, DELETE them. <u>Highlight them and delete them</u>, backspace them, cut them, whatever it is you know how to do. It only takes a second. <u>You MUST click the 'Forward' button first</u> and then you will have <u>full editing capabilities</u> against the body and headers of the message. If you don't click on 'Forward' first, <u>you won't be</u> <u>able to edit the message at all.</u>

- (2) Whenever you send an e-mail to more than one person, do NOT use the To: or Cc: fields for adding e-mail addresses. Always use the BCC: (blind carbon copy) field for listing the e-mail addresses. This is the way the people you send to will only see their own e-mail address. If you don't see your BCC: option click on where it says To: and your address list will appear. Highlight the address and choose BCC: and that's it, <u>it's that easy.</u> When you send to BCC: your message will automatically say 'Undisclosed Recipients' in the 'TO:' field of the people who receive it.
 - (3) Remove any 'FW :' in the subject line. You can re-name the subject if you wish or even fix spelling.

(4) ALWAYS hit your Forward button from the actual e-mail you are reading. Ever get those e-mails that you have to open 10 pages to read the one page with the information on it? By Forwarding from the actual page you wish someone to view, you stop them from having to open many e-mails just to see what you sent.

Finally, before you forward an Amber Alert, a Virus Alert or any of the other ones floating about these days, check them out before your forward them. Most of them are junk mail that have been circling the net for years! Just about anything that you receive in an email can be checked out at Snopes.

Tips and hints

Our Technical Officer, Neville Clifton, has sent in the following tip regarding RSS Feeds: Subscribe to <u>ABC TV RSS feed</u> and get the daily TV Guide using an RSS newsreader. RSS is an alternative view of a web page that allows you to subscribe and read the content in RSS newsreader software. Whenever the web page is updated your newsreader will automatically display the new item.

There are many news readers available and many are free. Some news readers are programs you download and install on your computer and others are web-based services that you access with your web browser. There is a list of RSS readers maintained at <u>DMOZ</u> <u>Open Directory Project</u>. To subscribe to an RSS feed, right-click on the orange XML <u>XML</u> icon and select "Copy Shortcut" or "Copy Link Location" to copy the location URL and then paste it into the appropriate place in your RSS reader. Follow the instructions for your particular news reader Terms of Use.

ABC RSS feeds are protected by Australian and international copyright laws and are available for personal, non-commercial use only. Info. from the ABC website.

PASSWORD PROTECT WORD DOCUMENTS

If you have a document that you want to protect from prying eyes, it is possible to assign a password to that document. <u>You must remember the password</u> as Microsoft has no way of recovering it for you! Write it down if you have to.

• With the document open, click *File, Save As*.

• Click the *Tools* button, then *Security Options* in Word 2003 (or *General Options* if you're using Word 2007). Enter a password. This must be entered every time you want to open the document.

• Click OK

More Tips and Hints

Why Turn Off the Message Preview in Windows Mail or Outlook Express?

The message preview pane is useful, but it comes with the risk of catching a worm or virus by just previewing an email if your virus protector is not up to date. That's why it is best to disable the preview pane for security reasons in Windows Mail or Outlook Express.

How to Disable the Preview Pane in Windows Mail or Outlook Express:

- Select *View / Layout...* from the menu.
- Make sure *Show preview pane* is not checked.
- Click OK.
