

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Tips and Hints

Cycling through the taskbar on Windows 7


Here is a neat way to cycle through and open windows in your Task Bar using your Windows Key: Hold the Windows Key down and click the number that corresponds with the window you want to open, and it will open!

Let me explain by example! Lets say you have 5 programs showing in your Task Bar to include Windows Explorer, Media Player, Internet Explorer, Snipping Tool and Notepad. If you hold the Windows Key down and click the number 4, your Snipping Tool will open as it is the 4th one on the list. Hold Windows Key down and click 5, and Notepad, which is 5th on the list, will open.

You can even take it a step further. Lets say you have several Internet Explorer browser pages open. You can hold the Windows Key down while repeatedly clicking "3" and it will cycle through all the open browser windows and open them.

This works for both open programs and programs you have pinned to the Taskbar. In my example, I have Internet Explorer and Notepad open; the other three items showing in my Taskbar are not open, but pinned links. This tip will open any of the items on the Taskbar, even if they are not currently active.

I click the Windows Key + 4 and show you a screenshot of my example:

LINDSAY'S LATEST WORD DISCOVERY



I love the Format Painter, that little paint brush in the Toolbar of Word 2003 or the Home Ribbon of Word 2007. However it has always frustrated me that it seemed to be a once only tool, i.e. it only applied the selected format once. I have now discovered that if you double click on that little paint brush then you can Format Paint as many times as you like. It works in both Word 2007 and Word 2003 at least. **Try it**. *Thanks to Lindsay Threadgate for this tip*.

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

How to sort names alphabetically in MS Word 2003.

- Each name is to be on it's own line.
- Highlight all of the names
- Click Table
- Choose Sort
- Click OK.

Sorting names alphabetically in MS Word 2007:

- Each name to be on it's own line.
- Highlight all of the names.
- Click on the Home Tab
- ◆ Click on the Sort button in the Paragraph section Paragraph



What is a botnet?

"The term bot is short for robot. Criminals distribute malicious software (also known as malware) that can turn your computer into a bot (also known as a zombie). When this occurs, your computer can perform automated tasks over the Internet, without you knowing it.

Criminals typically use bots to infect large numbers of computers. These computers form a network, or a botnet.

Criminals use botnets to send out spam e-mail messages, spread viruses, attack computers and servers, and commit other kinds of crime and fraud. If your computer becomes a part of a botnet, your computer might slow down and you might be inadvertently helping criminals."

Botnets are just one of the many good reasons to keep your antivirus and spyware up-to-date; and why you should never click on links in emails from people you don't know. Don't open attachments in emails unless you're positive you know who those emails came from -- and you were expecting an attachment. If you follow those suggestions, your computer

will never be part of a botnet. If you don't? Can you spell Z O M B I E?

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More Tips and Hints

Those people who were at the Members' Morning Tea will remember the good advice that was given by our President Bruce Deitz regarding 'unsubscribe' links. The same information was given in the Cloud Eight Premium newsletter and is repeated here for those who were unable to attend the Morning Tea.

DO NOT EVER CLICK AN UNSUBSCRIBE LINK IN A SPAM EMAIL

The only thing you'll be doing is verifying that your email address is live and working. The spammers will then save your email address in their database as a "good, working, email address" and when they've gathered up enough of them (hundreds of thousands) they sell these "verified" addresses to other spammers for lots of money. So don't ever unsubscribe to something you never subscribed to in the first place. You'll only end up getting more spam.

This of course does not apply to newsletters you willingly subscribed to, i.e. legitimate newsletters. The unsubscribe links in legitimate newsletters are required by the "Can Spam Act".

A good rule of thumb is this: If you didn't subscribe to it, you can't unsubscribe from it. If you can't remember if you did or not and it appears to be a legitimate site, visit the site and look for the newsletter subscription form. Normally there will be links or information telling you how to unsubscribe.

HOW TO ENLARGE TEXT ON A WEB PAGE

Make Text Bigger in Mozilla Firefox

Click "View", move the mouse over "Text Size", and select either "Increase" or "Decrease".

Make Text Bigger in Internet Explorer

Click "View", move the mouse over "Text Size", and then select a new size from the list that appears.

The easiest way of all is to hold down Control and use the scroll on the mouse - forward for larger and back for smaller. This will work on most web pages but not all!
