PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Our year is already off to a flying start with the Technical Team having been in from the day school resumed to update all the computers and to install the new Microsoft Office 2010 suite in Windows 7. This latest Microsoft donation, worth \$13,200, has added to the tremendous support the company has given us over the years and is greatly appreciated as it has allowed us to ensure that our hardware items are kept fully up-to-date.

Tutors have already attended the year's first train-the-trainer session where the new methods of presentation of our courses were explained. Some tutors have also attended an afternoon of role-playing where they have actually presented the courses to each other.

Courses have either been completely rewritten or greatly revised so that we can accommodate as many people as possible and so avoid people having to wait too long before they can attend classes. Our separate courses for Windows XP, Vista and 7 have been amalgamated so that instead of having 12 separate courses, we now have only three. Similarly, Outlook Express and Windows Mail have been combined into two courses instead of four.

Entirely new courses in Windows Live Mail and Google's Gmail have been prepared, so it is essential that people enrol for the correct e-mail courses because we will only be presenting the nominated programs in the course, so if you have Windows Mail, please do not enrol for Windows LIVE Mail, instead, attend that special course.

We have ceased presenting word processing in Office 2003, so all word processing, spreadsheets and presentations will be using Office 2007 and Office 2010 because the new "ribbons" have superseded the drop-down menus of former versions and this looks like being the way things are going in future. Even if you have a previous version of an Office program, many of the techniques are common to all word processors or spreadsheets. The only difference is in the way to apply them.

New noticeboards have been erected in the vestibule and all notices will be displayed only there in future. Please READ the information about each of the upcoming course requirements before you complete your application. They will be displayed in large print about two sessions ahead of presentation.

On all of the CDs used in the club, there is a special file "Important Information for Members". Please read it carefully as it contains essential information. By all means, print it out so that you can refer to it from time to time.

We know that quite a few members have purchased laptop computers during the past few months but at this stage we will not be using laptops and also discourage people from bringing in their own machines as they are not connected to our network and possible don't have the same software installed. In any case, the layout of the keyboards on laptops varies considerably from brand to brand and model to model, so the desktop keyboards that we use are all the same.

This year we have some fun outings planned and our Social Secretary and Travel Consultant Extraordinaire is planning to make some of our trips even more interesting than the recent train trip to Sydney which was a great success. In case you are wondering who this character is, he is our happy official photographer, Barry Keen, currently enjoying the scenery of beautiful Tasmania.

Classes begin again and we start with a "Know your Camera Course" on February the 4th. Courses fill up fairly quickly so check our website or the booking sheets at the clubroom.

We also have an outdoor shoot planned for Saturday the 5th at Stockton, all members will have received an email giving the details. We plan to cover the use of Wide angle and Telephoto settings and lenses. (it might be an idea to bring a chair)

Our teaching has evolved and thanks to a very professional screen we are now able to show video tutorials very easily in the classroom. This is important as we now use video tutorials in much of our teaching.

With summer here in all its glory bright skies and exposure can be a problem. An over exposed photo cannot be rescued but a slightly under exposed one can be. I suggest you try experimenting with your exposure settings, try -1, or try manually adjusting you aperture setting by closing the aperture a little. If you have a DSLR you can even think about a Neutral Density filter, some of the more expensive point and shoot cameras have an in built filter setting, so check your manual.

There is lots of fun ahead, so it is important to know what your camera can do and must of it is in your manual. You can also learn an enormous amount from some of the excellent online tutorial videos.

Practicing with your digital camera only costs you time, so fit in 20/30 minutes occasionally, you will be surprised how much you will learn.

Microsoft Office File Formats

You have a Microsoft Office program such as Word or Excel. Things used to be straight forward. All Word documents save as .doc files - you knew where you were. Mostly you sent copies to others and they could open them in their version of Word.

Then Microsoft introduced Office 2007 and 2010 and suddenly the default was different. Your friends who used a different version started saying the file wouldn't open on their version.

Lets' make something very clear.

If you want to save your files in .doc format in Office 2007 and 2010 then you still can. You can even make it the default. Or if you're brave you can save in the newer .docx format. Who would think one extra "x" would cause so much trouble.

How Can I Set Word 2007 to automatically still save in .doc format?

To change this setting, click on the Office Button in the upper left hand corner.



Now click the Word Options button in the menu.



Click on the Save tab, and then change the drop-down menu for "Save files in this format" to be "Word 97-2003 Document".

What about Word 2010?

Similar process but there now is no Office button. Instead use the FILE button, click on the Options button then click on the Save tab, and then change the drop-down menu for "Save files in this format" to be "Word 97-2003 Document".

How Can I Open Documents in Word 2003 that was created in Word 2007 0r 2010?

A free Microsoft program will convert any Word 2007/2010 document to a file compatible with earlier versions of Word. The converter available is the Microsoft Office Compatibility Pack. The program also converts 2007/2010 Excel and PowerPoint files to earlier versions.

Just click on this hyperlink to download - Microsoft Office

Compatibility Pack . Once downloaded just install as you would any other program. That's it!



Now open your friend's Word 2007 or 2010 file. It will also open their Excel or Power Point files also.

They'll stop trying to learn, because they don't believe they can. They'll give up trying to do things, because they don't believe that they're capable.

The secret that they won't accept is simply that it's likely that it's only their attitude that's stopping them. If that weren't in the way, they could learn, and they could do.

Computers can be damned complicated, and yes, they often are very frustrating, but that's not your fault.

Sadly, it's when problems arise I see person after person giving up, and putting the blame on themselves.

Unfortunately our fast-paced society has set up some really high standards: if you don't "get" this stuff instantly, you must be stupid. That couldn't be more wrong, particularly when it comes to computers. In fact, there's a good chance that the faster you think you're getting it, the more likely you are to be getting it wrong.
