You can make a contribution to your community even though you may or may not think of yourself as an influential leader - others probably do.



Hints & Tips



Connecting and using a memory stick:

The memory stick or USB stick behaves as if it was an ordinary data folder. Thus you can move, copy, delete, modify etc. data exactly like in the folders on your computer.



Memory sticks come in variety of sizes, the usual size found in stores currently range from 8 to 16 gigabytes. This should be large enough for most data and photo transfer.

Plug the memory stick into the USB socket found in the computer's front panel. Soon a new window will pop-up.

To access the data in the stick, choose Open folder to view files and click OK.

After connecting the stick, it will displayed as a disk drive. Its name differs depending on the name of the stick.

The easiest way to access the stick is by opening My Computer in which the flash drive can be found.

Removing the stick from your computer

When the stick is removed, there should be no ongoing transmission of data between the stick and the computer to prevent the data from corrupting. This is why the user should notify the system that the stick is about to be removed from the computer.

Open My Computer, right-click the icon of the USB stick and choose Eject.
