






Which Windows Operating System Should I Choose?




As you can see Microsoft control a large percentage of computer operating systems. Since this graph was produced in February Microsoft's share has slipped for the first time ever, just below 90%.

Many are blaming Windows 8 for not enthusing many desktop and notebook users. Microsoft admit people are "confused" by the system especially the "Metro" interface represented by tiles instead of a start button menu.



The statistics are not favourable when comparing Windows 8 and Vista – once described as their "worst operating system ever". Many people as you can see below still have XP and Windows 7.



Given XP support has been pulled and it is an "old" system many users are now looking to their next operating system. Other software companies like Adobe are also pulling software support for XP from the next versions of their software.

Which OS to use – Windows 7 or Windows 8?

Many large businesses have already chosen Windows 7 – it still has full support until January 14, 2020.

Some hardware manufacturers are reporting they sell a system with Windows 8 then have it taken off to replace it with Windows 7.

Microsoft have responded to these less than satisfactory statistics by promising a Windows 8 update – **Windows 8.1**. This will be released toward the end of the year as a **FREE UPDATE**. Included in the improvements – booting straight to the desktop as you could with previous operating systems. This means no tiled screens when you start the system, if you prefer.

Also Microsoft are "bringing back the start button". **Be cautious** with this one as it is only the start button. At no stage have Microsoft promised the old start menu, rather suggesting limited menu choices.
