Prose – You can enter one story only for each of the three topics

- 1. The Hat School Hats, rain hats, hard hats, baby hats, party hats, dunce's hats, berets, boaters, sun hats, swimming hats, army hats? This is a topic to take you to any time or place of your choosing in just 1,000 words or less as long as there is a hat involved somewhere.
- 2. Too Good to Use Great scope for imagination or reminiscences here! Most people have considered some possessions too good to use yet in the end would the enjoyment have been greater to use, than to just look and perhaps worry? For this topic you can write 1,000 words or less.
- 3. Out of the Blue! This is a real short story challenge. Can you write a really short but complete story in just 500 words? Try this challenge and test your skills in editing and tightening your story to make every word count.

Poetry – **You** can enter one poem only for each of the three topics

- 4. Try writing a poem without rhyme by using metaphors and similes, as well as rhythms you can explore the "music" of what some consider true poetry and what could perhaps become the words to a song. Just 300 words or less for this poem on any topic of your choice
- 5. A Poem about an event or incident using no more than 300 words.
- 6. A Poem about a particular location using no more than 300 words.

Technology Information



These articles are excerpts to illustrate changes on the way for software delivery, toward more subscription based services. At this stage Photoshop Elements it IS NOT proposed to become subscription based.

Adobe kills packaged software, bets on cloud alone

Adobe Systems has announced upgrades for its flagship software packages, including Photoshop, Illustrator and InDesign, will now be available only through online subscriptions.

Adobe is the latest traditional software company to make a big bet on the cloud-based subscription model pioneered by companies such as Salesforce.com and NetSuite and now common place in the anti-virus and office software markets.

Subscription models bring in less money upfront as payment is spread over the entire period of use unlike traditional packaged software, but typically ensure more predictable recurring revenue. They also allow for product upgrades and new features to be delivered on a shorter cycle and as needed.

Upgrades will be available only through online subscriptions from June according to Paul Robson, Adobe's managing director for Australia and New Zealand. "We will no longer do a major Creative Suite release every couple of years, but will announce them in Creative Cloud when they are ready to come to market," Mr Robson told Fairfax Media.

Creative Suite 6, launched in May 2012, combines Photoshop, Illustrator, InDesign, Flash and Dreamweaver software applications used by professional photographers and designers. Creative Cloud, the online platform for the packages, helps customers access them through online subscriptions. "With the fast pace of innovation, our customers are asking us to release as we go. Now we will release improvements and enhancements all the time through Creative Cloud.

Robson said customers who already owned a licence to the packaged Creative Suite would be encouraged to move to the cloud at a promotional price for a year - \$29 per month instead of \$49 per month for new customers. Single application subscriptions will cost \$19 per month.

YouTube planning paid subscription channels

BRIAN WOMACK AND ANDY FIXMER Google's YouTube plans to offer paid subscription channels in the next few weeks, sources with knowledge of the matter said, in a move that gives the world's biggest video service a new revenue source beyond ads. The channels will cost about \$US1.99 a month, said one of the people, who sought anonymity because the plans aren't public yet.

"We have nothing to announce at this time," YouTube said in a statement. "We're looking into creating a subscription platform that could bring even more great content to YouTube for our users to enjoy and provide our partners with another vehicle to generate revenue from their content, beyond the rental and ad-supported models we offer."
