Social Day Out


Some 17 participants braved a cold and windy but sunny afternoon at Green Point (Lake Macquarie) on the first weekend in August for a photographic session.

You never know ... your query may be the catalyst for a whole new series of classes!!!


AGM / LUNCH

We might all have our heads in the clouds from time to time but the term 'Cloud Computing' means something completely different. Basically, 'the cloud' is the storage of computer data you can access remotely over the Internet.

There are many reasons to use 'the cloud', but the main reasons are convenience and access. Instead of having to save a file to a USB flash drive or CD, you can save it to 'the cloud'. Saving the file to the cloud ensures you will be able to access it with any computer that has an Internet connection.

With the cloud you are much less likely to lose your data because it is stored on external servers. If your computer crashes, those files will still reside on the cloud and you can always retrieve them.

Dropbox

Dropbox, OneDrive and Google Drive are three products designed for general use. They are free to use unless you require a larger amount of storage. There are ways to acquire extra free storage through use and by referring others to the services.

There are two ways to use each of the services:

- Either, by logging into their website each time you want to access your data or upload a file
- Or, by downloading an application onto your main computer so you can synchronise all your data with any other computers you own, including your tablet device and your smartphone.

Cloud storage is hailed as a revolutionary breakthrough for backups. Using a strong password is a must for online services such as cloud computing.

As with any new trends people like to join in without full understanding – the "try it now, figure it out later" mindset!
