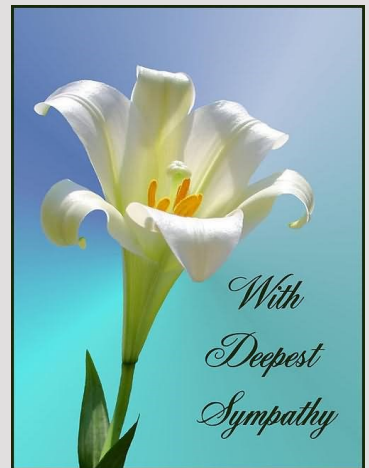

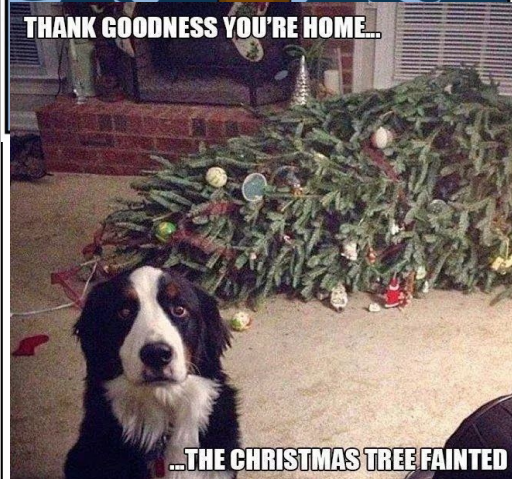

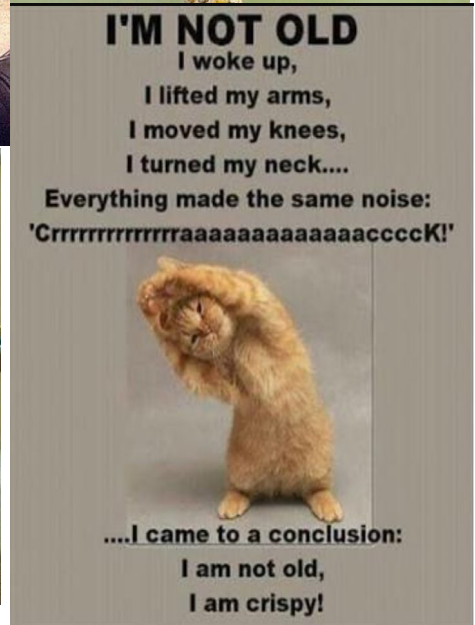

**Making Connections through Street Names:
Scott, Mitchell, Merewether, and the Mitchell Library.

It is well known that many of our street and suburb names are from those people who made considerable contribution to the development of our city. Who these people were and how they contributed is relatively easy to discover. The connection between them and landmarks such as the Mitchell Library probably takes a bit more digging.

Scott Street, in Newcastle after Alexander Walker Scott¹. Scott first arrived in Newcastle in 1827 as a trader in his ship Australia, he again visited in 1829 and took up a 2560-acre (1036 ha) grant on Ash Island. In 1831 he returned as a settler. With him was his mother and sister, both, Augusta Maria Scott. His brothers Robert and Helenus were already settlers on Glendon Estate near Singleton. Alexander Walker Scott's contribution to Newcastle is well documented.

Mitchell Street, in Merewether after Dr. James Mitchell². Mitchell, a surgeon was in 1820, appointed assistant surgeon to the 48th regiment then stationed in Sydney. He also was in private practice. Mitchell acquired many land holdings in the Hunter district by grant and purchase, including the Burwood and Rothbury estates. In 1833 James Mitchell married Augusta Maria Scott. They had two children, Augusta Maria Mitchell and David Scott Mitchell.

Merewether, the street and suburb after Edward Christopher Merewether³. Merewether came to Newcastle in 1861 as general superintendent of the Australian Agricultural Co. He built The Ridge on the Burwood estate. He had married Augusta Maria Mitchell, the year before. Merewether not only improved the fortunes of the A-A Co. but was heavily involved with management of the Burwood estate. In 1869, following James Mitchell's death, he assisted the family's counsel in litigation that eventually wrested control of Mitchell's estate from the confidence trickster, William Ernest Wolfskehl. The success of this litigation provided Dr James Mitchell's heirs considerable wealth through Burwood and Rothbury estates and other land holding in the Hunter Valley.

The Mitchell Library, after David Scott Mitchell⁴, son of Dr James Mitchell and Augusta Maria (Scott) and sister of Augusta Maria Merewether. David Scott Mitchell, a book collector and national benefactor, was in 1852 one of the first undergraduates of the University of Sydney. Mitchell had inherited considerable wealth from his father but showed little interest in the estates, leaving the management to agents. He became an avid book collector and upon his death on 24 July 1907 had bequeathed his entire collection of some 60,000 volumes to the State Library of New South Wales trustees with an endowment of £70,000 with an interesting proviso. After some minor bequests the residue of his estate of £261,000 went to his sister Augusta Maria. Despite his fine memory and erudition he wrote nothing and left as his one main memorial the Mitchell Library in Sydney.
