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President's Report

Happy Easter!

It is hard to believe we are a quarter way into 2021 and Autumn is here. The past few weeks have tested the resilience of many communities in our state as well as parts of Queensland. To those of you whose families and friends have been affected may the cleanup be as swift as possible.

This week I attended a webinar hosted by Good Things Foundation who run Be Connected. Associate Professor Anthony McCosker from Swinburne University led a team in evaluating the social impact of the Be Connected Program. The report revealed:

- The Be Connected program created a social return on investment of \$4.01 for every \$1 invested.
- The program has reached more than double the expected number of older Australians and has also had benefits for the wider community.
- Be Connected learners are safer online, more skilled, more confident, more socially connected and less lonely because of their participation in the program.

To those of you who are part of this amazing picture: "Thank you" and a special vote of thanks to all our Mentors who help deliver this program.

I heard a warning on early morning radio this week about two friendly, chattymen coming round supposedly checking for flood damage for compensation claims, wanting to inspect your home but people who let them in were finding their homes burgled. Evidently these two parasites were eliciting information about shopping and social habits during their "chats"...BE CAREFUL

Phone and email scammers are still proliferating. I have just checked the spam folder on my mobile phone to find 48 spam texts that have been detected and blocked in the last 24 hours. Every day I find at least a dozen that the phone has blocked. Remember a ringing phone is an invitation to chat, not a royal command, so sometimes it is safer to let your answering machine monitor your calls, and then you can call back in your own time



With the BOM report promising???? a cloudy day with a possible morning shower, 20 intrepid photographers gathered in Carrington for a photographic walkabout.




