I would like to take this opportunity to alert my friends on Facebook to please be aware of some of the Facebook posts you comment on especiall now while the world seems to be at a standstill. These posts ask questions such as, "What was your favorite teacher's name? Who was your 1st grade teacher? Who was your childhood best friend? What was your first car?" etc. Do these questions sound familiar? They should. These ar the same questions you are asked as security questions when setting up bank accounts and credit card accounts. When answering these questions and posting them, you are giving out answers to your security questions that you may be using without realizing it. Hackers are setting these up as a "get to know each other better" game on Facebook. Thanks and stay safe.

This was sent to me by a friend who lost a large sum of money because she used familiar names and places for all her passwords including her banking and also filled in these

little "fun" survey questions. Her bank told her that whoever depleted it had logged in correctly using her codes, which just happened to be the names of her first teacher and a street where she used to live. Please be careful when setting up accounts and filling in these 'harmless' little surveys

NBN CALLING - SCAM

The chance of the NBN calling you is virtually Zero.

You have bought your internet from an ISP (Internet Service Provider) like Optus or Telstra, so if there was any thing that was wrong – **they** would be calling or texting you.

Before ever allowing anyone to connect to your device, you should only do this if you initiated the call, i.e., you called them for support etc. and therefore know that it is the company you called.

If you are calling them in response to an email or SMS – please be careful as this may be a phishing scam too so always dial the number you have for the provider **not** the one in the message!

If a legitimate service call is being initiated there should be verification steps involved before you can discuss the matter at hand – no one is going to just call you and ask for control of your device.

Please use — Font: Times New Roman, Size: 14 point, Lines to be double spaced.

CATEGORIES Up to 3 topics allowed

1 Femininity / Masculinity The essence of being male or female of any age.

2 Companion Animals Capturing the magical attraction of small furry, hairy, scaled or feathered companions.

3 Seasons and Weather The delights and excitement of the seasonal or climatic changes in the natural world around you.

4 Dusk to Dawn Strange things that inhabit your dreams.

5 Just Plain Ugly It's in the eye of the beholder.

6 Life Changing Event What was the effect of the event? Please avoid anything to do with a pandemic.

Champion Creative Writers — winners will be selected by judge/s.

40 points for first place, 30 points for second place 20 points for third place, 10 points for highly commended, 1 club point for each topic entered.

Winners will be announced at the ASCCA Conference on 10th November.

Their names, their selfie and entries will be published on the ASCCA website after 10th November 2021.

Digital Photography Competition 2021 – Guidelines

Entries open 15th September and close at midnight on 30th September 2021.

Send your entry, with your head and shoulders (selfie) photograph and a completed entry form to competitions@ascca.org.au.

ASCCA Board members and professional photographers are ineligible to enter.

The approach this year is on creativity and interpretation of the categories. Photographic technical ability is still important but not more important than the creative interpretation of the subject. Considering both will allow all entrants to show their abilities. The seven categories include enough scope and a broad enough explanation to allow entrants with a wide range of skills and imagination to confidently enter any category. **All entries are to be submitted by the individual photographer who is permitted to present one photograph, to a maximum size of 4MB in each category, taken between 2nd September 2020 and 15th September 2021**.

No post camera manipulation will be permitted — except minor cropping, straightening and exposure adjustments.

CATEGORIES Up to seven photos allowed

1.0 People — **Femininity/Masculinity** - More than an image, rather a visual expression (your interpretation) of the essence of being male or female of any age.

2.0 Companionable animals - Filling a void (or finding a place) at any age. Capturing the magical attraction of small furry, hairy, scaled or feathered companions.

3.0 Nature — **The Seasons and Weather** - The delights and excitement of the seasonal or climatic changes in the natural world around you.

4.0 Night time — **Dusk to Dawn** - Any image captured at night with or without additional artificial lighting.

5.0 The Wild Card — Just Plain Ugly - It's in the eye of the beholder.

6.0 *Simplicity* - *Images which say more with less and/or by powerful composition and/or the use or absence of colour.*

7.0 Form in nature - Images that capture naturally created lines, shapes, patterns, or mathematical sequences, etc. in the natural world.

Champion Digital Photographers — winners will be selected by judge/s.

40 points for first place, 30 points for second place 20 points for third place, 10 points for highly commended 1 club point for each photograph entered.

Winners will be announced at the ASCCA Conference on 10th November. Their names, selfies and entries will be published on the ASCCA website after 10th November 2021.
