17th to 23rd May is National Volunteer Week to celebrate the significant contribution of Australia's almost six million


volunteers. Each year these volunteers

REPORT – COMPUTERPALS SOCIAL ACTIVITIES FOR APRIL 2021

With a pleasing roll-up of 65 members, including a few potential members, President Sandra started proceedings with an outline of the Club's recent teaching activities. Following reports from the Social Secretary and Treasurer, Lindsay Threadgate then advised members of the numerous IT computer items that were surplus to the Club's requirements and were available to purchase. Next came a very interesting segment from Caroline Keane and Mitzi Gordon on the uses and benefits of using smart home devices – amazing what can be done with a swipe or a tap on your smart phone. The ability to turn home lights, air -conditioners etc. on and off and see who is pressing your front doorbell, all the while you are in another area altogether certainly had members and their guests sitting on the edge of their seats. Lucky door prizes of smart home devices were then drawn and won. A slideshow of photographs taken by members on the previous Social Day outing were shown with corresponding small prints displayed, members being asked to pick their favourite shot in each of the 8 categories the photos were grouped in. They say 'winners are grinners', and this was certainly the case with the winners of the various topic's photos who took home a yummy box of chocolates.

During the photo slideshow plates of assorted sandwiches, slices, crackers and cheese, tea and coffee were served by hard working helpers, ensuring everyone had a satisfying end to what was a most enjoyable and informative Club event.

A reminder about the Car Observation Run to be held on Saturday 1st May next.

Due to the popularity of our previous Car Observation Run, I have decided to try another for our next C'Pals Social Day, to be held on Saturday 1st May next.

Again, the starting point will be McDonald Jones Stadium, with a new route taking you through Broad-meadow, Islington, Carrington, Mayfield North, Kooragang Island and finishing in Stockton.

Details for the day are as follows;

Date: Saturday 1st May 2021

Meet: McDonald Jones Stadium, Lambton

Time: 10.00am (M/Tea - Darks Coffee at the Stadium)

10.30am (approx.) depart on observation run

Again, I would emphasize that this is not a race, rather a question and answer social drive to 'hopefully' arrive at said destination. At the pre-run briefing, you will be given your instruction sheets showing the route to travel and questions to be answered along the way. It is estimated that completing the run should take approx. 1.5-2 hours. Whilst a driver only entrant can participate in this event, it is strongly recommended that an observer is present (assisting with directions/looking for clues/writing answers/saving time etc.), enabling the driver to concentrate more on driving. All clues will be on the LHS (unless specified in your notes) while a few will necessitate leaving your vehicle.

Stop Press: Change of Itinerary - we will be lunching at a hotel (own expense) in lieu of a picnic, so no need to bring your own eats, drinks (or chairs/table etc.). It is felt this will be more comfortable, given the vagaries of the weather at this time. However, don't forget your hard folder (backing to write on) along with a pen/pencil.

If you intend coming and have not yet done so, please complete the attendance form with details of who is going, phone nos. etc.and submit it a.s.a.p. We do need this form sent in so all details appear on our master sheet, enabling us to ensure all entrants are accounted for, both at the start and at the finish. Conversely, if you are registered as attending and then cannot make it on the day, please be sure to ring and advise me on my mobile.

See you at the Stadium - Saturday 1st May next 10.00am M/Tea and 10.30am start. If you intend coming, please fill out the attendance form and submit it – we do need all your details for insurance purposes and to ensure that no one goes missing on the day.
