President's Report—October has been a period of busy transition time for the Club on a several fronts.

- 1. The termination of lease (effective 15/11/21) and closure of the 15 Hubbard St Islington classroom.
- 2. Notifying all interested parties of our change of address and new phone number, amending insurance cover and complying with statutory requirements and updating our website information and informing members by email.
- Sorting out what assets to keep and what to dispose of, as not required by the club going forward. Selling/disposal of the assets not required. Packing up and moving what we want to keep into storage.
- 4. Finding new premises to run face-to-face classes.
- 5. Revamping the class schedule and determining the hybrid methods of delivery of classes. Working out the how and where and co-ordinating time availability of tutors to fit the new timetable.

Number 1 is done. Number 2 is done.

Number 3 is partly done - members will have to opportunity to come in to the 15 Hubbard St premises on Wednesday (3/11 from 10:00 to 12:00 noon) to make an offer for any of the assets still available that are no longer required. You need to come and have a look. After that any leftovers will be advertised for sale on Facebook Marketplace.

Number 4. Is partly done - we have secured space at Club Lambton (Lambton Bowling Club, 51 Karoola Rd, Lambton - near the swimming pool) on a Monday from 10:00 am for face-to-face learning devoted to BeConnected classes for new people needing to meet us for the initial time and ongoing. Other venues are being pursued with good prospects, however, we are open to suggestions from you, the members, if you can think of any other venues we can check out. They need to be free or very low cost. Ground floor with accessible access. Good parking. Preferably near public transport.

Number 5. We have <u>revamped the class schedule</u> to reflect our hybrid delivery of face-to-face and Zoom classes. Afternoons have been left available for people in need of one-on-one help maybe over a coffee at a club or café or maybe in their home (this is expected to be at a higher cost).

COVID-safe practices must be in place to protect all parties. Entry into Club Lambton (and no doubt other venues) will require masks on, signing in with the QR code, and displaying your Double Vaccination certificate.

COVID is not going anywhere for a long time and being cautious and staying safe will continue to be necessary even when you are vaccinated. The more people we can help to use their devices to get online the better for their health and safety.

We have found the use of social media - phone calls, video calls, chats, Zoom sessions and similar all have played a part in keeping people in touch with family and friends during lockdown and will continue to be part of our lives going forward. It has been good for their health (physical & mental). Now, it's the 'new normal'. People, particularly seniors, need to know these things. If you have friends or neighbours and acquaintances - spread the word that we are here and available to help them with their needs.

We can help people learn to use their devices to safely shop online, safely do their banking online and safely do business with government agencies online (e.g. Centrelink & Medicare or car licences and registrations). They can learn how to use QR codes and get the QR code Apps onto their phones along with the COVID vaccination certificates that they need to go into a lot of venues and for travelling.

And how to avoid scams.

SOME SCAM WARNINGS

COMMON SENSE WILL MOSTLY KEEP YOU SAFE.... But it is very easy to second-guess yourself and fall into the scammer traps. Trust your instincts. If in doubt...HANG UP. If you have questions, call Computerpals for information. **Our new phone number is 0478 219 220**

"This message is from Services Australia. Please DO NOT REPLY by email as this mailbox is not monitored.

Your refund is ready. You will need to complete the outstanding tasks and submit your claim to be assessed from the earliest date possible. To do this, sign in to myGov"

NEVER CLICK ON A LINK IN AN EMAIL OR TEXT MESSAGE, EVEN IF IT APPEARS TO BE FROM A GENUINE COMPANY. Scammers are very good at copying sites and logos. Always investigate (if you have to) from the company website. E.g. the myGov link above was in an email to me. On logging in to the myGov website I found it listed there as a scam.

Another big NO-NO - A few weeks ago I got a phone call (supposedly from Microsoft) telling me their satellite had discovered a problem with my computer...yes, that one's back again... They requested remote access to my computer so they could diagnose and fix the problem which would only cost me \$273, but if left unfixed would completely destroy my hard-drive. They used a lot of technical terminology and were very insistent that it was a problem only they could fix as the details had not yet been released to the general public, but they had contacted me as a special favour. AS IF!!!!!!!! Microsoft will never call you because, believe it or not, they do not have satellites focused on your home computers. You deal with this one by hanging up the second they identify themselves as Microsoft. If you wish you can call Microsoft to check on the phone call (which I did and their advice was "hang up") but again, it all comes down to common sense.

This scam has been circling the Internet for years and is now doing the rounds again. With Christmas just weeks away the scammers are playing on the generous dispositions of the soft-hearted.

Gift giving during the holiday season should be a selfless celebration, but even the holiday spirit won't stop online scammers. According to NBC and additional outlets, a message popping up on Facebook and Instagram claims that people can participate in a "secret sister gift exchange"—and it's a recurring scam

This particular "gift exchange" has reappeared online every year since 2015, per <u>Snopes</u>. The message calls for buying one \$10 gift and sending it to someone on the list. In classic pyramid scheme fashion, the promise is you'll receive as many as 36 gifts in return, including books and wine. Sadly, this is just one of the <u>14 other Facebook scams you need to take seriously</u>. Check the Snopes website for more information
