From the desk of Brenton, our Social Organizer Extraordinaire. Thank you Brenton, you do a magnificent job

Our next outing will be to the Hunter Wetlands at Shortland on Friday 10th November 2023.

These Wetlands are a mecca for a multitude of birdlife, with some 217 species represented in some 56 families having been recorded there, including waterbirds, migratory waders, pigeons, parrots and honeyeaters just to mention some. Ibis, egrets, ducks and frogs also call this place home, while a number of endangered and vulnerable species are also found here. In addition to these and other living creatures, the Wetlands Centre has its own nursery, specializing in native plant species including shrubs, grasses and water/wetlands plants. Such diversity lends itself to a photographer's windfall, and as such and in conjunction with Digipals, we will be providing you with a list of set subjects to capture with your camera or phone for review at a later date.

The Wetlands Centre provides free car parking with disabled parking and set-down zone, ramps and a lift from the visitor centre to ground level, hard stand gravel and mown grass trails, along with wheelchair accessible toilets. Details for the day are as follows;

When: Friday 10th November 2023

Time: 9.30am - Morning Tea

10.00am - Explore and photography

11.30am - 12.00pm???? - Lunch (optional)

Cost: Entry - \$5.00 (senior/pensioner), M/Tea, Lunch - at your expense

The usual outdoor activity 'necessaries' are suggested, including comfortable walking shoes, hat/cap, insect repellent, sunscreen and, of course, your camera/phone. You might like to print out the walking trail map and bring it with you for obvious reasons (http://wetlands.org.au/).







A Letter from Graham King

Dear Friends and Supporters,

I am again taking part in the MS Sydney to the Gong Bike Ride to be held on Sunday 5 November 2023, which is the main fundraiser for MS. This is the 18th time I have ridden in this event and the first time as an octogenarian as I turned 80 in March this year. I am therefore calling it my OctoGONGarian bike ride and together with all the other riders I will be raising donations which go directly to supporting sufferers of MS, as the costs of running the event are covered by the entry fees.

Multiple sclerosis is the most common disease of the central nervous system in young adults and it strikes young people in the prime of their lives. It affects more young people than any other chronic neurological condition and the average age of diagnosis is 30. It can strike anyone at any time and the systems vary widely. For instance, can you imagine waking up one day unable to do the everyday things you usually take for granted? Like not being able to see properly (or at all), or you physically can't get out of bed, or you can't even walk to the phone to call someone. There is no cure. Cases of MS are rising and over 33,300 Australians live with the condition; an increase of 30% in the past four years.

I am therefore taking on this challenge to ride from Sydney to the Gong to help people living with MS to get the support they need to achieve their goals and live life to the fullest.

I have done 17 previous Gong Rides between 1998 and 2022 including the "2020 Virtual Gong Ride" during the pandemic where participants had to set their own goals and do individual rides in their own areas. My goals were to ride 500km for the month of October including 100km in one day and to raise \$1,000 and I am proud to say I was able to achieve all three goals. Last year I completed the actual course to Wollongong in 4 hours and 5 minutes and raised over \$1,000 in donations. This year the course is basically the same starting from Tempe Recreation Reserve along the Princes Highway to Waterfall and then through the Royal National Park and then down the coast road over the Sea Cliff Bridge at Stanwell Park and finishing at Lang Park, Wollongong. The distance is 82km and my goal is to finish in under 4 hours.

All riders are raising money to fight multiple sclerosis and I have set a modest goal of \$750 which I hope to exceed.

Multiple sclerosis strikes people in the prime of their lives, and there's no known cure. That's why I have again challenged myself to ride to Wollongong to fight MS.
