

## Are we safe when using the internet?


At ComputerPals we always spend sessions on the topic of using the internet safely. We break the topic down into easy to understand sessions so as not to overwhelm you with information.

Unfortunately, the Internet is home to certain risks, such as malware, spam, and phishing. If you want to stay safe online, you'll need to understand these risks and learn how to avoid them.

#### 7 Tips for Protecting Yourself Online

- 1. Keep your computers and mobile devices up to date. ...
- 2. Set strong passwords. ...
- 3. Watch out for phishing scams. ...
- 4. Keep personal information personal. ...
- 5. Secure your internet connection. ...
- 6. Shop safely. ...

## Watch out for these top internet scams

#### **Disaster Relief Scams**

When disaster strikes so do fraudsters, whether it's a pandemic or weather-related. Hiding behind the guise of an actual aid organization, scammers typically use a tragedy or natural disaster to con you out of your money. By thinking you're donating to an emergency relief fund, you unwittingly provide credit card or other e-payment information.

**How to Avoid Them:** Only give to established, legitimate organizations. Visit GuideStar or Charity Navigator to verify the validity of any <u>charitable organization</u> you are considering supporting before you donate.

## **Grandparent Scams**

With grandparent scams, a fraudster poses as a panicked grandchild who needs cash right away for some emergency—to get out of jail, to leave a foreign country, or to pay a hospital bill. The COVID-19 pandemic made it even easier to sell compelling lies: "I'm in the hospital with COVID. Please send money right away."

**How to Avoid Them:** Resist the urge to act immediately. Scammers pull at your heartstrings and rely on you to respond quickly—before you've had a chance to think things through. Verify the caller's identity and ask questions that a stranger wouldn't be able to answer. Confirm the story with other family members or friends, even if (or especially if) the caller says to keep it a secret. And never send cash, gift cards, or money transfers.

## Here are 2 of these tips:

## **Quick-Switch From Numbers to Letters**

Switching onscreen keyboards when you need to type a number or symbol is an all-too-often occurrence on iPhone, so here's a tip for making the transition super-swift.

Rather than tap the "123" key to switch to the number/symbol keyboard, hold down on it and slide your finger over to the key you want, then let go. This single action types the number/symbol and automatically switches you back to the alphabetical layout, avoiding the need to perform three separate taps to achieve the same result.





#### QuickTake Video

On iPhone 11 and later models, you can record videos without even switching out of the default photo mode. To capture a quick video in the Camera app, just press and hold the shutter button, then release it to stop recording.

To keep recording video without having to hold the button, slide the shutter button to the far right. The shutter will stretch elastically under your finger as you do so, and a target padlock icon will appear. When placed on the padlock, the shutter button will remain located there for as long







as you shoot video. You can also tap the shutter to take a still photo during the recording. When you're ready to stop shooting video, simply tap the record button below the viewfinder.
