Member story – Lindsay Threadgate

I had been "retired from BHP" after 40 years at the end of 2001, and after about 6 months my late wife Jan said "I have found something that you should get involved in". After her repeating the statement several times over the next couple of weeks I conceded to go along and "see".



ComputerPals had not yet held its 2nd AGM and was still "finding its feet" so to say. Peter King, a man of great

enthusiasm, was President and made me feel very welcome. Then there was Bruce Deitz, I recognized him immediately and said "Deitz, Graham, I am Lindsay Threadgate" (you see I went to school with him). Bruce responded "No I am the good looking one, I am Bruce". Well I was close, Bruce actually taught at Cessnock High School while I was there.

I met Peter Wales and his wife Carol, it was they who had told Jan about the club on a chance encounter. Jan had worked on the high school canteen with Carol and Peter. Roger Cornish was next, another old acquaintance, at BHP this time, we were trainees a couple of years apart. I was about to join and soon attend regularly, I am member No. 178. Carolyn Keane pipped me by a few weeks, she is the longest serving active member, her member No. 139.

Not long after I joined, one of the several "taps on the shoulder" occurred, "you know enough to tutor", "we want you on the committee", "you can lead the technical team", "vice president"

In those days we were in the old building of Islington Public School, things were developing at a rapid pace as senior people scrambled to "learn the computer". It was not long and Tutors were teaching 4 x 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ hour lessons in a day with eight students in each.

Although the constitution of the Club allowed for 4 years in any of the four executive management positions the practice had been for the President to serve 2 years. Peter King, Nel Wattiez, Peter Wales done their respective 2 year terms as President and then came one of those "taps on the shoulder", it was Michael Pitt, "will you accept if I nominate you?"... It was 2006 coming up to the AGM. I became the 3rd President of ComputerPals for Seniors – Newcastle Inc. It is coming up to 22 years since I joined.



Tips from Google to help keep you safe online

1. Take the Security Checkup

One easy way to protect your Google Account is to take the Security Checkup. This step-by-step tool gives you personalised and actionable recommendations to help to strengthen the security of your Google Account.

2. Defend against hackers with 2-Step Verification

2-Step Verification helps to keep out anyone who shouldn't have access to your account by requiring you to use a secondary factor on top of your username and password to log in to your account. For those who are at risk of targeted online attacks and need even stronger protections, we've created the Advanced Protection Program.

3. Use strong and unique passwords

Creating a strong, unique password for every account is one of the most critical steps you can take to protect your privacy. Using the same password to log in to multiple accounts, like your Google Account, social media profiles, and retail websites, increases your security risk.

4. Maintain up to date software

Here's how to spot the fakes, and protect yourself and your money when shopping online.

The domain name doesn't add up

Experian recommends taking a good look at the domain name to see if it is actually what you think it is, or if it varies ever so slightly (or even significantly) from what you're expecting. For example, if you're shopping for Pandora jewelry, it's possible you might land on the URL Pandorapick.com, which sells imitation Pandora jewelry, reports the Better Business Bureau. Some tip-offs that it's a fake site are bad grammar in the website's copy, and no encryption at the point of purchase to keep your credit card info safe. (FYI, the real website is Pandora.

The URL is missing the "S" in "HTTPS"

Before making a purchase on an e-commerce site, make sure that the URL starts with "HTTPS," *not* "HTTP." That all-important "S" stands for "secure".

Other flags include: it seems too good to be true, there is no return policy, no contact information, bad reviews

TIPS and TRICKS

Android phone : Stop disturbances without the fuss

Sometimes you need to silence your phone quickly and discreetly. (You don't have to tell me the reason. In fact, I'd prefer it if you wouldn't.) Whenever that time comes, don't mess with on-screen menus and icons: Many phones, including Samsung's recent Galaxy devices and Google's current Pixel models, can simply be flipped face down on any flat surface to have all of their sounds silenced in a heartbeat.

On Galaxy phones, you can confirm that the setting for that function is on by searching for "Mute with gestures" in your system settings. On a Pixel device, you'll want to search your settings for "Flip to Shhh."

Other fast-muting shortcuts may also be available. Certain phone models made by OnePlus, for instance, feature a physical alert switch that lets you move to a silent mode by sliding a physical mechanism on the side of the device. And on any Android device, you can always just activate the display and then press either volume button to reveal a simple silence icon within the on-screen volume slider.

Android phone : Get to your camera in a flash

When a photogenic moment arises — be it your child checking out her first TPS report or your co-worker getting a little too crazy at the company retreat — two seconds can be the difference between an unforgettable snapshot and an after-the-fact image. So don't futz around with unlocking your phone and looking for the on-screen camera icon; instead, just double-tap the device's power button to jump straight into shooting, whether your display is on or not.

That shortcut works on many current Android devices, including both Pixel phones and Samsung's recent Galaxy gadgets (though on pre-2017 models, you'll need to use the physical Home button instead of the power button). If it doesn't work on your device, try searching your system settings for "gestures" to see if it or another similar option is available and perhaps just requires you to toggle it on before it'll function.

Lock down your phone if you lose it

If your phone is ever lost or stolen, you can visit your Google Account and select "Find your phone" to protect your data in a few quick steps. Whether you have an Android or IOS device you can remotely locate and lock your phone so that no one else can use your phone or access your personal information.
