Garden Island Excursion April, 2014

On Thursday 24th we had 34 starters for a trip to the Garden Island Naval Base.

Participants gathered in the early morning dawn at their chosen station for the trip to 'the big smoke' aboard the 6.18am train ex Newcastle. At Central, hi-vis lanyards/name badges were distributed so all were easily spotted among the usual masses present. Following our short journey to Circular Quay, a comfort stop and a cuppa for some was had, prior to a short trip to The Island via ferry.

We were met there by members of the Naval Historical Society who briefed us on the day's activities following morning tea in 'The Boatshed', the third building built bearing that title. We then split into 3 groups with a guide each to explore the base. Some of the more notable stops included the Kuttabul Memorial (in honour of the ferry sunk by a Japanese midget submarine), the Captain Cook Graving Dock (opened in 1945, it can hold around 3,000 million litres of water and can be pumped dry in just 4 hours! – simply amazing), and the Naval Chapel and Chapel of Remembrance (the stained glass windows in these were stunning to say the least). Wondering how the Base could be an island when it was part of the mainland, we were advised Garden Island was joined to the mainland in 1942 as part of the construction of the Captain Cook

Searching

Search engines are huge databases of web page files that have been assembled automatically by machine.

Search engines compile their databases by employing "spiders" or "robots" ("bots") to crawl through web space from link to link, identifying and perusing pages. Once the spiders get to a web site, they typically index most of the words on the publicly available pages at the site.

Whenever you search the web using a search engine, you're asking the engine to scan its index of sites and match your keywords and phrases with those in the texts of documents within the database.

It is important to remember that when you are using a search engine, you are NOT searching the entire web as it exists at this moment. You are actually searching a portion of the web, captured in a fixed index created at an earlier date.

Basic Searching

- Use the plus (+) and minus (-) signs in front of words to force their inclusion and/or exclusion in searches.

EXAMPLE: +meat -potatoes (NO space between the sign and the keyword)

- Use double quotation marks (" ") around phrases to ensure they are searched exactly as is, with the words side by side in the same order.

EXAMPLE: "bye bye miss american pie" (Do NOT put quotation marks around a single word.)

- Put your most important keywords first in the string.

EXAMPLE: dog breed family pet choose

- Type keywords and phrases in lower case to find both lower and upper case. Typing capital letters usually returns an exact match.

EXAMPLE: president retrieves both president and President

Quick Tips for Boolean Searches

In Boolean searches, always enclose OR statements in parentheses.

EXAMPLE: Yosemite (campgrounds OR reservations)

Always use CAPS when typing Boolean operators in your search statements. Most engines require that the operators (AND, OR, AND NOT/NOT) be capitalised.

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
